3. Access to Each Site

Site #1: Travel by vehicle on the Reynolds Creek Forest Service Road to the 864, then take the Anzac Forest Service Road to the main camp. 15 km.

Site #2: Travel by horseback 8km in on a horse trail leaving the Anzac Forest Service Road.

Site #3: Travel by horseback leaving main camp and going 12 miles up Anzac River on North side of river on Horse trail, or travel up Crocker Creek Forest Service Road to 22km and then take horse trail in 1 mile to site.

Site #4: Travel up Parsnip River by River boat 10 miles leaving Parsnip River Bridge to cabin.

Site#5: Travel by horseback-12 km up North side of Crocker Creek on horse trail to cabin site.

Site #6: Travel by horse back 8 km up old logging skid trail to cabin site.

Site #7: Drive from 1052km to Boulder Creek at 1086km by vehicle. Then go by quad from 1086km to 1106km on old access road to CN Tunnel. Then hike on trail up mountain fro 3 miles into cabin site.

4. Drinking Water

We will obtain drinking water at main camp site #1 using existing well.

We will comply with the Drinking Water Protection Act.

5. Disposal of Garbage

All garbage will be hauled out to main camp and then hauled out to Bear Lake and put into transfer station.

6. Disposal of Sewage and Grey Water

Site #1 has sewage system in place. All other sites will have toilets in place away from any water course. Dish water will be placed in one specific place away from any water course.
